DDOT Mission:

The District Department of Transportation's mission is to equitably deliver a safe, sustainable and reliable multimodal transportation network for all residents and visitors of the District of Columbia.



What is moveDC?

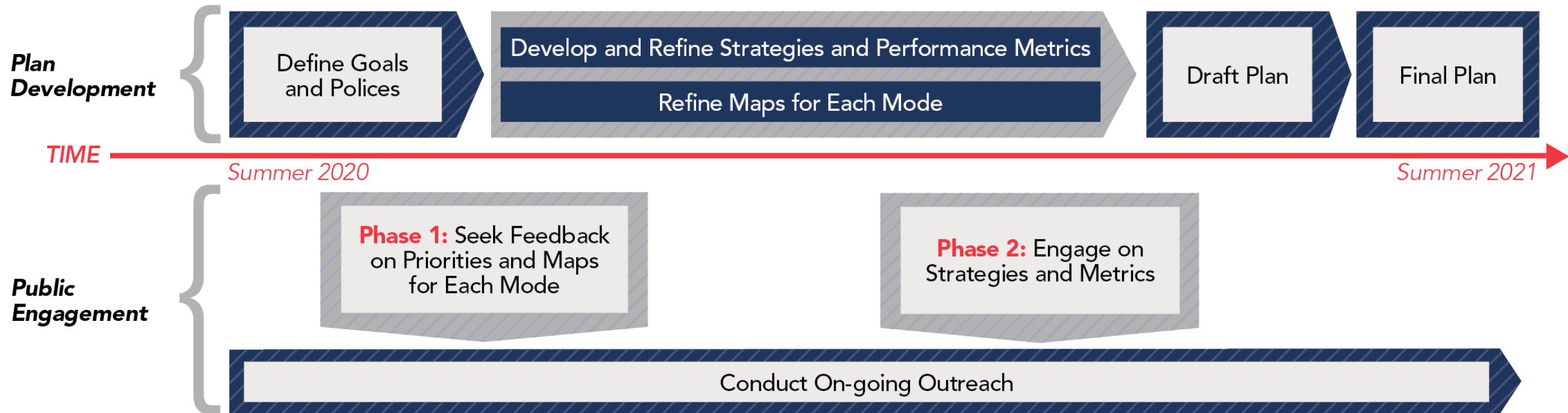
What is moveDC?

- District Department of Transportation's (DDOT's) plan that **sets the 25-year vision** for the transportation system in Washington, D.C.
- Used to **guide and prioritize** investment and development
- Updated regularly to reflect the **evolving needs** of the District
 - Completed in 2014
 - Update to be released in 2021



moveDC fulfills the federal requirement to develop a long-range transportation plan

Equity in moveDC

DDOT has developed an equity statement for moveDC, available on the plan website.

It is DDOT's intention that equity manifests in all of the goals and policies of moveDC. Equity is a foundational and driving factor that undergirds the plan and process.

DDOT's definition of equity includes four key areas:

1. Participatory planning and decision making
2. Shared and just system outcomes
3. Attention to historically under-resourced communities
4. Overcoming existing disparities

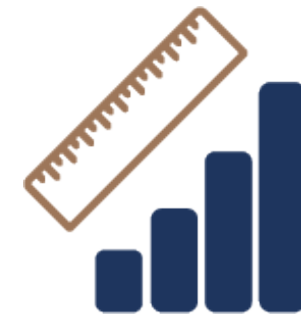

What are policies?

Policies are principles or statements that guide DDOT's decision-making and day-to-day business to achieve goals.

The moveDC policies align with the moveDC goals and DDOT's mission and vision, specifically incorporating equity.



Policies Should Be:

- ✓ *Long-lasting*
- ✓ *Future-proof*
- ✓ *Simple and Targeted*
- ✓ *Complimentary to Plan Goals*

Example Policy: Maximize bus reliability through strategic transit priority treatments.

Opportunity:

Increase the transportation system's capacity to move more people and serve District residents equitably.

Importance:

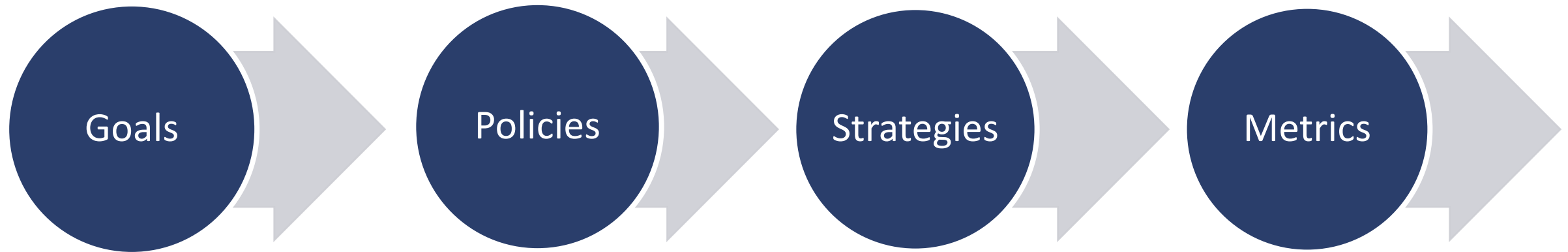
Everyday almost as many District residents ride the bus as Metrorail and they need high quality, reliable service.

Outcome:

Keep riders moving faster and connect people more efficiently to what's important.

moveDC 2021 Plan Framework



Example:
Safety

Design transportation infrastructure to improve safety for all, focusing especially on our most vulnerable roadway users.

Create protected intersections, sidewalks, and bike lanes

- Number of protected intersections installed
- Miles of protected bike lanes installed
- Number of sidewalk gaps filled

Draft Mobility Priority Networks

What is a Mobility Priority Network?

- A network of District streets where DDOT will invest in safety and mobility improvements for specific modes of transportation
- At this stage, DDOT is developing networks for **transit, bicycles, and freight**



Purpose of Mobility Priority Networks

- To make it easier to **move people and goods** on District streets
- To **enhance safety, efficiency, connectivity and access**
- To **make future decisions** related to project identification, design, and development
- To **focus tradeoffs** in the use of limited curb-to-curb space
