Regional Compact to End Homelessness

• Adopted unanimously on January 13, 2021

• Effort led by the COG Human Services Policy Committee during 2020 & informed by the COG Homeless Services Committee

• Five Action Items

- 1. Data Sharing
- 2. Regular Reporting
- 3. Regional By-name Tracking and Case Coordination
- 4. Residency Requirements
- 5. Racial Equity





Deepening Regional Collaboration: Building the Infrastructure

Action Items 1 and 2: Data Sharing and Regular Reporting

Regional Data Metrics Working Group

- Comprised of HMIS (Homeless Management Information System) administrators & data leads
- Creating a Regional Dashboard on the COG website
- Will inform key elements of a **Data Sharing Agreement**
 - Expansion of the existing agreement (District of Columbia, Prince George's County, MD and Montgomery County, MD) pending Virginia's statewide Homeless Data Integration Project (HDIP) implementation in northern VA



Why Does Data Sharing Matter?

Reliable, Quality Data is Foundational

- Ability to share client information improves care coordination & outcomes
- More efficient placements in permanent housing through quality By-Name Lists and data sharing
- People who are not on any jurisdiction's priority housing list may "fall through the cracks" without better data tracking and sharing as they move around seasonally



Deepening Regional Collaboration: Building the Infrastructure

Action Item 3: Regional By-name Tracking & Case Coordination

Regional Case Coordination Learning Collaborative

- Comprised of Coordinated Entry Managers: "Air traffic controllers" for the Continuum of Care
- Focus on prioritization practices, assessments, and sharing approaches to care coordination



Data Sharing Success

Veteran Data Sharing & Regional By-name Tracking & Case Coordination

- Monthly data matching of By-Name List (DC/Montgomery/Prince George's County)
- One veteran was on two jurisdictions' list for housing. Data sharing allowed each county to:
 - 1. Locate the veteran
 - 2. Place the veteran in housing in the jurisdiction of their choice





Deepening Regional Collaboration: Expanding Understanding

Action Item 4: Residency Requirements

- A truly regional system would allow for greater client choice and better meet the need
- Change requires coordinated action across and within jurisdictions







 Alignment of sources to support capacity to address disparities in our systems of care






Table 1 - Census, Poverty and PIT Count Rates by Race



Key Takeaways in Ending Homelessness

- Significant reductions in people experiencing homelessness
- Unprecedented investments in housing and homelessness prevention contributed to declines
- Ending the experience of homelessness is possible with adequate investment and strategic cross-jurisdictional collaboration

Opportunities for Legislative Action

Larger Resource Need / Longer-term Impact

- Sustained and increased regional investments in permanent housing.
 - Consider incentives, support, and outreach to landlords with quality units
- Sustained and increased regional investments in adequate shelter facilities. Resources are necessary to allow people to freely choose where best to meet their needs and be close to family, friends, and work opportunities.

Lower Cost / Shorter-term Impact

- Support and encourage sharing data within and across the region's CoCs to strengthen local programs and improve outcomes for people experiencing homelessness.
 - Support increasing data analysis staff capacity
- Funding for regional staff capacity to coordinate and support local actions
- Opportunity to fund support of the development and analysis of an assessment protocol enhancement to replace the tool no longer being supported by HUD.



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
