Washington Regional Alcohol Program

- Founded in 1982, the nonprofit [501(c)(3)] Washington Regional Alcohol Program (WRAP) is an award-winning public-private partnership working to prevent drunk driving and underage drinking in the metropolitan Washington region.
- Through public education, innovative health education programs and advocacy, WRAP is credited with keeping the metro-Washington area's alcohol-related traffic deaths historically lower than the national average.
- WRAP, however, may be best known to area residents via the organization's popular free safe ride service for would-be drunk drivers, SoberRide®.
- The 31st-annual "How Safe Are Our Roads?" report is prepared by COG for the nonprofit WRAP.



Findings from the Report

- Fatalities: Regional alcohol and/or drug-impaired traffic fatalities increased by 12.94 percent between 2021 and 2022 (from 85 to 96 such fatalities).
- Injuries: Regional alcohol and/or drug-related traffic injuries increased over 9.54 percent between 2021 and 2022 (from 1,489 to 1,631 such injuries).
- Crashes: Regional traffic crashes attributed to alcohol and/or drugs increased by over 13 percent between 2021 and 2022 (from 3,694 to 3,853 such crashes).
- Arrests: Local arrests for either driving under the influence (DUI) or driving while impaired (DWI) decreased by 9.3 percent between 2021 and 2022 (from 10,248 to 9,296 such arrests).



Recommendations

Double-Down on What Works

- Sobriety checkpoints
- Technology including ignition interlocks

Buckle-Up

Including enacting primary seatbelt legislation in Virginia

Increase Testing

- Mandatory for all drivers in fatal crashes (2023 Virginia bill)
- Oral fluids pilot programs

Embrace Technology

- Ignition interlocks
- Passive (inc. Maryland and Virginia's Driver Alcohol Detection System for Safety / DADSS programs)



Recommendations

Alternative to DUI

- SoberRide® (District of Columbia / Maryland / Virginia)
- Rideshare
- WMATA / Metro (inc. restoration of weekend / evening hours of service)

Ensure/Maximize Reciprocity

 Fully implement state-to-state driver history record capability thereby gaining "timely, accurate information on high-risk drivers at the time of their encounter" (AAMVA)

Enforcement

- Fully staff, support and prioritize DUI enforcement
- "Traffic safety IS public safety!"





Project Purpose & Objectives

VISIONZERO ARLINGTON COUNTY

- Alcohol is a contributing factor in 1 out of 5 fatal crashes in the region.
- Arlington, in coordination with other regional Vision Zero communities (Montgomery Co, Prince Georges Co, DC, Alexandria), is researching:
 - Existing and successful anti-drunk driving programs and strategies
 - Regional alcohol-related crash patterns and factors
- The objective is to create recommendations for regional municipalities to use to educate their communities on local drunk driving issues and alternatives to foster a consistent message across the region.
- Information gathered from this effort could also inform the future development of relevant marketing materials.







There is no safe way to drive drunk.


















Research & Literature Review

VISIONZERO ARLINGTON COUNTY

- Benchmark the state of the practice on reducing impaired driving:
 - Documenting existing programs in the region that target impairment and crashes,
 - Identifying states/municipalities with lowest impairment rates in the Country or globally as well as their key policies,
 - Identifying factors that lead people to drive impaired or potential incentives that encourage people not to drive drunk, and
 - Furnishing a literature review to document best practices for messaging toward behavior change.






Regional Crash Data Review

VISIONZERO ARLINGTON COUNTY

- Conduct a detailed review of crash data for alcohol-involved crashes in the region:
 - Patterns in locations of alcoholinvolved crashes.
 - Patterns in origins of the drunk drivers involved in a crash.
 - Patterns in factors or circumstances around alcohol-involved crashes.
 - Other trends or outlying factors identified in the regional review of alcohol-involved crashes.



Campaign Recommendations

- Create uniform campaign strategy that can be shared and disseminated using existing resources to link people to existing, funded anti-drunk driving resources.
- Furnish a list of actions for municipalities ranging from no-cost actions to larger scale initiative concepts.
 - For those concepts that would require larger-scale initiatives, this project can be used to "make the case" to foster policy changes or generate funding for bold initiatives to discourage impaired driving and reduce alcohol-related crashes.

Finalize literature review, research, and data analysis

Share findings and results throughout the region
