- Other barriers to increasing market access for local food: a deeper dive on customer demand, contracts, pricing, and relationship building
- Market opportunities for local food in the Chesapeake: regional analysis, strategic planning for longer term growth

- Community Networks: Leveraging existing infrastructure, community assets for Local Food
  Distribution hope to be able to arrange a visit from a New York-based project piloting some
  innovative solutions on last mile delivery using community resources.
