




# **Short History: Food & Agriculture at COG**





Left: The Regional Ag Work Group published *What Our Region Grows* for the second time in 2019. Right: Here is the geography that *What Our Region Grows* covers for many, but not all data points. The Regional Ag Work Group has long recognized that our foodshed is larger than the COG region.





COG expanded Agriculture Program with additional Regional Food Systems focus in 2016.

Convened stakeholders on issues like regional food system infrastructure and food policy.




# The Region's Food and Agriculture Future?

- Environmental benefits of agriculture








# Food Insecurity in the COG Region

- Households with children, Black and Hispanic/Latino households disproportionately burdened
- SNAP is first line of defense against food insecurity
  - 50+% increase in participants between Jan 2020 and Jan 2022
  - Est 530,000+ residents enrolled (Jan 22)
  - Est \$113+ million in benefits (Jan 22)
  - Critical pandemic emergency allotments still in place, not clear how long additional funds to participants will continue
- Some providers (throughout region) reporting increased demand for emergency food

- Members include elected officials and senior staff from local and state agencies and nonprofits.
- Expanding so all 24 COG member jurisdictions can participate.

#### Mission:

 To support the development of long-term regional direction and collaboration toward a more resilient, connected food and farm economy (food system) across urban, suburban and rural communities in the metropolitan Washington region that provides more of the region's food needs.



## **FARM Priorities**


- Improving food security in the region

RE: Request for Extension of USDA Waiver Authority

Dear Chairwoman DeLauro, Chairman Leahy, Ranking Member Granger, and Vice Chairman Shelby:

On behalf of the Food and Regional Agriculture Member (FARM) Policy Committee of the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments (COG), we are writing to ask you to extend U.S. Department of Agriculture's nationwide waiver authority through the 2022-2023 school year.

As the association of local governments in the metropolitan Washington region, COG supports measures that will increase food security in the region. Given the impact of the ongoing public health crisis on families and children, continued flexibility is needed to meet students' nutritional needs.

The food security challenges facing our residents and schools mirror those seen nationally. COVID-19 has exacerbated food insecurity everywhere, and communities of color and households with children have been disproportionately impacted. In the Metropolitan Washington region, our schools' food and nutrition services divisions continue to have to pivot to provide healthy meals safely, all while grappling with supply chain challenges and labor constraints. The flexibility that USDA has provided to states and schools through waivers has been critical to enabling them to respond in innovative ways and ensure that those children experiencing food insecurity have access to quality meals. This

Reducing food insecurity is a central goal of the FARM Committee and one of COG's legislative priorities. We hope that USDA will continue to support schools and other sponsors beyond the end of June as we recover from the pandemic. We must ensure that they can continue to operate as seamlessly as possible to provide meals to students.
