BRAC Overview

- Not like previous BRACs
 - Complex and diverse -- All branches involved
 - Geographically broad
 - Different focus: security not cost-savings

- Key problems:
 - Coordination no single POC
 - Lack of detailed information



Key Themes for Arlington

- We should view BRAC impacts as an opportunity.
- We may not know what's going to happen until it does: prepare to be reactive!
- We must think very carefully about finding other replacements for this economic anchor.
- Where possible, new programs and initiatives should have relevance beyond BRAC.

- 5. Communications and Outreach: Informing to ease concerns and highlight opportunities
- 6. Federal and State Legislative Initiatives: Pursuing support to mitigate impacts
- 7. Marketing Strategies: Promoting Crystal City's advantages and opportunities
- 8. Monitoring/Management/Evaluation: Ensuring efficient and effective plan implementation



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Top Ten First Steps

- 1. Establish a **BRAC transition center**
- 2. Streamline the **permitting process**
- 3. Initiate a formal planning process
- 4. Formulate **funding strategies**
- 5. Develop a marketing and communications plan
- 6. Conduct **research** to understand workforce and business needs
- 7. Establish a focal point for **coordination** of BRAC activities
- 8. Develop a project-specific work plan
- 9. Formulate business incentive strategies
- 10. Institute an ongoing monitoring, management and evaluation program



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
