Last October, the TPB added Virginia's Beltway HOT (High Occupancy/Toll) lanes project to the region's long-range transportation plans. The HOT lanes will be free of charge to carpoolers, while simultaneously giving single drivers the option of paying to use the roadways. Both Virginia and Maryland are currently examining other highway corridors as possible sites for HOT lanes.

Two guest speakers will brief the committee on how HOT lanes work and how they are being implemented across the nation. The Committee will discuss how HOT lanes are—and could— be developed in the Washington region. The Committee and staff will also discuss the HOT lane scenario that will be studied under the TPB's Regional Mobility and Accessibility Study.
