Biographical Information about the Speakers

Sean Quinn, Director, Pedestrian Projects Group, New York City Department of Transportation.

Mr. Quinn has over nine years' of pedestrian planning, design, and implementation experience in New York and New Jersey. Over the past eight years at NYC DOT he has successfully implemented projects which redesigned city streets with an eye toward safety, mobility, and economic development. He has planned and implemented numerous projects in every borough, even seeing a few through to capital construction. He is currently a co-director of the Pedestrian Projects Group. Mr. Quinn holds a Master of City Planning from Rutgers University.

George Branyan, Pedestrian Program Coordinator | Policy, Planning and Sustainability Administration | District Department of Transportation.

Mr. Branyan has served as the Pedestrian Program Coordinator at the District of Columbia Department of Transportation (DDOT) since 2005. Mr. Branyan works on a variety of engineering, education, enforcement and development review projects within DDOT's Policy, Planning and Sustainability Administration. Mr. Branyan managed the development of DC's first Pedestrian Master Plan in 2008 and advocates for innovative practices and policies to improve pedestrian safety and access in Washington DC.

Will Handsfield, Transportation Director, Georgetown Business Improvement District.

Evan Goldman, Vice President - Development, Federal Realty Investment Trust.

Mr. Goldman manages the redevelopment of Pike & Rose in North Bethesda, Maryland and other redevelopment opportunities in Federal Realty's portfolio. Federal Realty is a retail-focused real estate investment trust (REIT) and a leader in mixed-use, transit-oriented development with projects like Bethesda Row, Rockville Town Square and Pike & Rose.
