

Welcome to Economic Trends in Metropolitan Washington!

This is an annual publication of the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments. This year's report focuses on economic trends between the years 2001 and 2005, and is divided into sections covering population, employment, federal expenditures and obligations, labor force, construction, retail sales, mortgage rates and new home sales, personal income, inflation, and transportation.

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hroughout the report, information is presented at different levels of geographic specificity. These levels and their components are outlined below:

The Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments (COG) The 20 members of COG include the District of Columbia: Frederick County, Montgomery County, Prince George's County, and the Cities of Bowie, College Park, Gaithersburg, Greenbelt, Rockville, and Takoma Park and the Town of Bladensburg in Maryland; and Arlington County, Fairfax County, Loudoun County, Prince William County, and the Cities of Alexandria, Fairfax, Falls Church, Manassas, and Manassas Park in Virginia.

The Washington DC-MD-VA Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA), (see map) as defined by the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) in 1983, extends beyond the membership of the Council of Governments to include Calvert and Charles counties in Maryland; and Stafford County in Virginia.

Executive Summary

ECONOMIC TRENDS AT A GLANCE

■ POPULATION

The region grew by more than 312,600 people between 2001 and 2005. The majority of this growth occurred in the region's outer suburbs, which increased by 17.5 percent or 180,600 people. The inner suburbs, with the addition of 140,700 people, grew by 5.2 percent. The region's central jurisdictions lost 8,700 people, or less than one percent.

■ EMPLOYMENT

Between 2001 and 2005, the region added 119,342 jobs. As a result, the total number of jobs rose to 2.71 million in 2005. Between 2001 and 2005, more than 53 percent of total job growth occurred within the outer suburbs, followed by the inner suburbs with 30 percent and the central jurisdictions with 17 percent.

■ FEDERAL SPENDING

Federal spending in the Washington region increased to \$107.9 billion in FY 2004, up from \$97.1 billion in 2003. More than 48.9 percent, or \$52.8 billion, came in procurement contract awards which, for the sixth time, exceeded expenditures in the region for salaries and wages.

LABOR FORCE

Between 2001 and 2005, the civilian labor force in the Washington region increased by 175,700 people, to a total of 2,877,800. Of that number, 2,780,300 were employed and 97,600 were unemployed, putting the unemployment rate for the civilian labor force in the Washington region at 3.4 percent in 2005.

■ CONSTRUCTION

Commercial construction in the metropolitan Washington region decreased during 2005, with developers breaking ground on more than 24.4 million square feet of space. In 2005, commercial construction in the region decreased from the 2004 total of 27.7 million, and was far below the 2000 total of 48.6 million. The number of new, privately owned housing units authorized in the region decreased from 34,646 in 2004 to 32,849 in 2005.

■ MORTGAGE RATES, HOME SALES, AND HOUSING-RELATED INFLATION

Mortgage rates continued to fall between 2001 and 2005 to a low of 5.9 percent in 2005 (first and second quarters). Average rates rose from 5.8 percent in 2004 to 6.1 percent in 2005. The number of homes sold in the region jumped dramatically between 2001 and 2005, from 86,966 units in 2001 to 106,920 units in 2005. The rate of change in the Consumer Price Index for housing in the Washington-Baltimore DC-MD-VA-WV CMSA increased from 3.5 percent between 2003 and 2004 to 3.8 percent between 2004 and 2005.

■ INFLATION

The rate of change in the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) for the Washington-Baltimore DC-MD-VA-WV CMSA increased 2.8 percent between 2003 and 2004 and increased by 4.0 percent between 2004 and 2005.

■ INCOME

Total personal income in the Washington region grew by an average annual rate of 5.7 percent between 2000 and 2004, leading to a 2004 total of \$231.4 billion. On a per capita basis, income varied greatly by jurisdiction, with a regional average of \$47,553

■ RETAIL SALES

Retail sales in the region increased both in current and real terms between 2001 and 2005. The region's 2005 total of \$69.6 billion, when adjusted for inflation, was less than the total annual retail sales in 2004, \$71.1 billion, and more than the 2003 total of \$67.8 billion.

■ AIRLINE PASSENGERS

More than 64 million passengers flew into or out of the Washington region's three major airports in 2005, a 25.4 percent increase from 2001.

Population of the Washington DC-MD-VA MSA, by Jurisdiction, 2001-2005



The region grew by more than 312,600 people between 2001 and 2005. The majority of this growth occurred in the region's outer suburbs, which increased by 17.5 percent or 180,600 people. The inner suburbs, with the addition of 140,700 people, grew by 5.2 percent. The region's central jurisdictions lost 8,700 people, or less than one percent.

Despite the dramatic growth rate in the outer suburbs, the population remains anchored in the inner suburbs, where 58 percent of the region's population lives.

According to COG's Draft Round 7.0a Cooperative Forecasts, the inner suburbs will remain the most populous "ring" of the region. COG forecasts that in the year 2030, the region will hold nearly 6.6 million people (45.2 percent more than the 2000 population). A full 53 percent of the 2030 population is expected to live in the inner suburbs.

Population Change, 2001 - 2005 (Thousands)





Between 2001 and 2005, the region added 119,342 jobs. As a result, the total number of jobs rose to 2.71 million in 2005.

Between 2001 and 2005, more than 53 percent of the total job growth occurred within the outer suburbs, followed by the inner suburbs with 30 percent and the central jurisdictions with 17 percent. More than 50 percent of the region's jobs, 1.4 million, remain in the inner suburbs. During the same time period, 55 percent of the region's job growth occurred in three jurisdictions: District of Columbia (28,200), Loudoun County (21,127 jobs), and Prince William County (16,223 jobs).

According to COG's Draft Round 7.0a Cooperative Forecasts, the inner suburbs and central jurisdictions will remain the region's employment center. In the year 2030, 30 percent of all jobs will be in the central jurisdictions, around 50 percent in the inner suburbs, and 20 percent in the outer suburbs.



Federal Spending

ederal spending in the Washington region increased to \$107.9 billion in FY 2004, from \$97.1 billion in 2003. More than 48.9 percent, or \$52.8 billion, came in procurement contract awards which, for the sixth time, exceeded expenditures in the region for salaries and wages. More than 31.0 percent of the region's federal spending was from the Department of Defense.

Northern Virginia was home to more federal spending than either the District of Columbia or suburban Maryland, with more than half of the Northern Virginia total going to procurement contract awards. The District of Columbia received a large percentage of its federal funds from procurement and salaries and wages, while suburban Maryland's total was split among procurement, direct payments to individuals, and salaries and wages.


Labor Force

etween 2001 and 2005 the civilian labor force in the Washington region increased by 175,700 people, to a total of 2,877,800. Of that number, 2,780,300 were employed and 97,600 were unemployed, putting the unemployment rate for the civilian labor force in the Washington region at 3.4 percent in 2005. The unemployment rate in the region has remained steady between 2001 and 2005, averaging 3.7 percent.

Unemployment in the District of Columbia, 6.5 percent in 2005, remained higher than in suburban jurisdictions, which averaged 3.0 percent.

Construction

Commercial construction in the metropolitan Washington region decreased during 2005, with developers breaking ground on more than 24.4 million square feet of space. In 2005, commercial construction in the region decreased from the 2004 total of 27.7 million, and was far below the 2000 total of 48.6 million. Montgomery County saw the most new commercial construction with more than 4.0 million square feet, followed by the District of Columbia (3.98 million square feet) and Prince George's County (3.87 million square feet).

The number of new, privately, owned housing units authorized in the region decreased from 34,646 in 2004 to 32,89 in 2005. Of the permits that were issued in 2005, almost half were in the outer suburbs.






Effective Mortgage Rate, 2001 - 2005


Housing-Related Inflation

The rate of change in the Consumer Price Index for housing in the Washington-Baltimore DC-MD-VA-WV CMSA increased from 3.5 percent between 2003 and 2004 to 3.8 percent between 2004 and 2005. Nationally, housing inflation increased during the same time frame. This measure accounts for price changes in rents and mortgage payments, owner costs, fuels, furnishings, and household supplies.



Total personal income in the Washington region grew by an average annual rate of 5.7 percent between 2000 and 2004, leading to a 2004 total of \$231.4 billion. Total income growth was fastest in the outer suburbs, where income increased by an average of 8.0 percent per year.

On a per capita basis, income varied greatly by jurisdiction. Arlington County topped the region in per capita income at \$58,310. Stafford County had the lowest per capita income at \$32,378. The per capita income for the region was \$47,553 in 2004.




etail sales in the region increased both in current and real terms between 2001 and 2005. The region's 2005 total of \$69.6 billion, when adjusted for inflation, was less than the total annual retail sales in 2004, \$71.1 billion, and more than the 2003 total of \$67.8 billion.

When adjusted for inflation, retail sales in the region increased by 9.5 percent between 2001 and 2005. Nationally, sales increased by ten percent.



Central Jurisdictions

The central jurisdictions are defined as the District of Columbia, Arlington County, and the City of Alexandria.

Inner Suburbs

The inner suburbs are Montgomery County, Prince George's County, Fairfax County, and the Cities of Fairfax and Falls Church.

Outer Suburbs

The outer suburbs are defined as Calvert County, Charles County, Frederick County, Loudoun County, Prince William County, Stafford County, and the Cities of Manassas and Manassas Park.

Washington Primary Metropolitan Statistical Area (PMSA)

As a result of the 1990 Census, Office of Management and Budget has modified the definition of metropolitan areas for federal statistical purposes. Under this definition the Washington PMSA, the Baltimore PMSA, and the Hagerstown PMSA have been combined into a new Consolidated Metropolitan Statistical Area (CMSA). The individual PMSAs are expanded and separately recognized as PMSAs. Unless otherwise noted, this report continues to use the 1983 definition of the MSA.

Washington-Arlington- Alexandria DC-MD-VA-WV (MSA)

As a result of the 2000 Census, the new MSA includes the Bethesda-Gaithersburg-Frederick, MD Metropolitan Division and the Washington-Arlington-Alexandria, DC-MD-VA-WV Metropolitan Division. Where as most of the data in the Economic Trends report is based on the 1983 MSA definition, the Labor Force data is based on this new level of geography.
