

Community energy planning is a rising practice that complements other forms for municipal and regional planning, including land use planning and transportation planning. These plans help municipalities and regions develop long term energy management strategies that maximize reliability; reduce costs; and minimize greenhouse gas emissions.



Peter Garforth is Principal of Garforth International, LLC a consulting group set up to help companies, cities, communities, property developers and policy makers develop competitive approaches to reducing the economic and environmental impact of energy use. In addition to his current responsibilities Mr. Garforth has also served as a visiting professor at Purdue University, lecturing on business and the economic aspects of energy. Previously he ran a consultancy in Brussels, providing services to companies, utilities, governments and institutions in the USA and Europe, with projects in the USA, Eastern and Central Europe, Indonesia, India and Brazil. Locally, Mr. Garforth was part of the team that developed Loudoun's Community Energy Plan and he is currently working on Arlington's Community Energy Plan. He was also the co-chairperson of the International Advisory Committee at the Alliance to Save Energy in Washington, D.C.
