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GRIDLOCK: A Regional Problem

Traffic congestion impacts everyone

- Social costs
- Economic costs
- Environmental costs

Regional Problems: A Regional Solution?

Traffic congestion and the problems it creates requires a more coordinated regional approach to

- decision-making
 - budgeting
 - funding

Regional Solution: A Regional Transportation Authority?

- Lack of regional coordination and disconnect between planning and implementation functions
- Regional models in many areas of the country
- House Resolution proposes a regional authority through the Transportation Planning Board

Regional Transportation Authority: What are the Barriers?

- Jurisdictional self-interest and loss of local control
- Land use policies and their impact on other jurisdictions and the region
- Environmental concerns and the impact of highways versus transit
- Funding source issues

What are the Alternatives

- Create and expand sub-regional authorities
- Expand inter-jurisdictional agreements
 - Project based
 - Limited regional authority
- Federal funding commitment

What Role Can COG Play?

- Public Information and Marketing
- Facilitate and promote sub-regional agreements
- Develop collaborative relationships with business community and other stakeholders
- Explore alternative funding sources
- Enhance and promote small-scale, achievable projects

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
