## Freight Program Update

Freight staff are working on a National Capital Region Freight Plan. This plan will profile the region, provide updated freight forecasts, and compile a list of potential freight projects that would improve goods movement in the region. The anticipated timeline for a draft release for public comment is February 2010.

## CSX National Gateway and Norfolk Southern Crescent Corridor

The CSX and Norfolk Southern railroads are the two major Class 1 railroads in the National Capital Region. They both have put forth ambitious multi-state projects to improve rail movements.

In seeking federal funding in support of these initiatives, both railroads highlight the benefits in emission reductions from truck diversions, vehicle miles traveled reduced, congestion savings, jobs, and tax benefits created. The graphic to the right illustrates the U.S. greenhouse gas emissions from trucks versus trains (U.S. EPA).

## I-95 Corridor Coalition Freight Academy

The I-95 Corridor Coalition will hold its second Freight Academy in April 2010. The Academy is held at the Center for Advanced Infrastructure and Transportation (CAIT) at Rutgers University in New Brunswick, New Jersey.
