### Dave Thomas Foundation for Adoption to Lead Region's Wednesday's Child Program

On January 1, the Dave Thomas Foundation for Adoption began its sponsorship of <u>the Wednesday's Child program</u> to find adoptive homes for children in foster care in the National Capital Region. It will also operate the program in Atlanta, Los Angeles, New York City and Philadelphia through a two-year grant from the Freddie Mac Foundation, which is winding down its activities in 2014. NBC4 and the Council of Governments will continue to support this program, which features children in foster care who are waiting to be adopted on local news television segments.



"Our work to identify waiting children to be featured on Wednesday's Child and plan the segment is one of the most important ways we serve the region," said Chuck Bean, Executive Director of the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments. "We are thrilled that the Dave Thomas Foundation has joined us as a sponsor and will continue the great work of finding permanent homes for our children."

Wednesday's Child began in the 90's in Washington, DC on NBC4 affiliate WRC. Barbara Harrison, NBC4 anchor, introduced the community to a child in foster care with the hope that a News-4 viewer would see the child, hear more about them, and ultimately decide to adopt. Over the past 21 years, COG, NBC4 and the Freddie Mac Foundation, joined in this unique private-public, created over 425 families in the DC region. We are proud that this amazing tradition is being carried forward by the Dave Thomas Foundation for Adoption to continue the great work of the Wednesday's Child program.

### Jurisdiction Spotlight: Loudoun County Department of Family Services

The Foster Care Advisory Committee is pleased to welcome our newest member Christi Carmouze, Foster Care and Adoptions Recruiter and Trainer with Loudoun County Department of Family Services. We are thrilled to have Christi join us. Recently I sat down with Christi for a Q&A. Following are some highlights from the interview.

**Tell me a little about your background. How long have you been in the child welfare field?** My educational background is counseling psychology. I worked for in Human Services for 4 years before coming to child welfare now for 4 years. Previous to this position, I was a facilitator for foster care family partnership meetings required by the state in Virginia. I loved working with families in that more neutral position, where I could be helpful and provide guidance.

*How long have you been in your role as a trainer & recruiter?* I have been in the role as the Loudoun County Foster Parent Trainer and Recruiter since March. This position offers me the opportunity to continue to help children and all families by providing accurate information, clarifying expectations about foster care and the children we serve.

**What aspect of your job are you most passionate about?** I am definitely most passionate about providing resources for foster parents before, during and after training. Especially by connecting them to each other so they can be each other's primary and most significant resource.

What do you hope to attain from being a member of the Foster Care Advisory Committee at COG? I hope to gain ideas, hear about what has worked as a strategy to recruit specifically teen centric individuals and also to have a hand on the pulse of metro area foster care activity.
