Current Challenge

"Business and industry draw employees across county and state lines. For the school to career activities to be limited by jurisdictional lines simply defeats the purpose of the program..."

How Do We Address the Challenge?

Develop a framework to encourage cooperation on common ground between School-to-Career programs within the Metropolitan Washington Region.

Potomac Regional Education Partnership (PREP)

- 1998 Created by region educators.
- 2001 COG adopted as a formal program.
- Membership Local jurisdictions
- Focus
 - Facilitate communication between education and business.
 - Foster collaboration on issues of mutual concern.
 - Encourage seamless education opportunities.
 - Establish competitive advantage in global economy.

What is a School-to-Career Program?

- High school and community college based activities
- Business based learning experience
- Connecting partnerships A bridge between schools and the business community

What is the Recommendation?

- Encourage cooperation between School-to-Career programs on common ground.
- Identify successful practices from which to choose within the existing local program models
- COG and participating jurisdictions become the regional champions.

Characteristics of Current School-to-Career Programs

- Vary by jurisdiction
- Operate independently
- Graduates are not equally prepared for the workforce
- Different business fields (agriculture, finance, arts, technology, construction, hospitality, sales, public service, transportation, etc.)

- Improve student attendance, academic achievement, and graduation rates.

- Businesses get better qualified applicants
