



Community Need: at DES & Germantown



Community Need at DES & Germantown

- Germantown is an extremely diverse (65% minority), unincorporated community that currently has the **fastest rate** of increased poverty and population in Montgomery County.
- Current estimates predict that the population is close to **100,000** residents, and that **16%** of the Germantown residents have an income less than **200%** of the federal poverty level.
- ▶ 73% of DES student households qualifying for Free and Reduced Meals (FARMS) and 76% of students now or have in the past have received FARMS;
- > 90% minority;
- 38.4% limited English Proficiency;
- 17.4% mobility rate (entrants and withdrawals);
- Struggling academic performance;
- DES educates 650 students, of which 135 currently live in the mobile home park community. This is the only mobile home park community in Montgomery County with approximately #500 residents in #174 mobile homes;
- DES is the only Title I school in the Clarksburg Cluster; and
- No local community governance, anchor nonprofit organization, school-based health centers or linkages to learning programs north of Gaithersburg.

TG Planning Collaborators' Questions...

- What can be done to complement the trusted relationship and vital role of the school that enables the school to educate and focus vital resources for empowerment for the children, households and community?
- How do we educate our educators, families, case workers, etc. on the impact of childhood trauma and importance of early learning and education?
- How do we address race inequities across systems (e.g. health disparities, academic achievement gap, mass incarceration, disproportionality, etc.?
- How do we improve the health of our community by addressing the social determinants of health (e.g. safe and stable housing and communities, healthy food access, safety, access to health and wellness services, impact of adverse childhood experiences, education, etc.)? Community outcomes are so intertwined. If our children do not have access to vision care, how are they going to learn to read?
- How do we provide the appropriate <u>multi-generational</u> supports to households, communities, and schools to empower the transition out of poverty? How do we intervene to support the whole household?
- ➤ How do we not duplicate or recreate, but maximize the current resources, programs and services available through strategically targeted investments?
- How do we encourage investments and expand capacity based upon data analytics? How do we change the trend from disinvestment to investment in communities that need it the most?
- How do we measure collectively our successes and return on investment? What are the common data analytics?

Strategic Systems Approach:

- Thriving Germantown uses the Community HUB Pathway Connect model to integrate, coordinate and evaluate the pilot;
- Promise Neighborhoods—are communities of opportunity centered around strong schools—to wrap children in education, health, and social supports from the cradle to college to career, effectively coordinating the efforts of schools, families, social services, health centers, and community-building programs, all children can fulfill their promise;
- Healthy Montgomery priorities to establish and sustain health in all policies; develop integrated care programs and expand access to mental health services and enhance linkages between mental health, substance abuse, disability, and other social services; and offer combined diet ad physical promotion progress for residents with diabetes;
- Montgomery Moving Forward's Early Childhood/Education Collective Impact work;
- Nexus Montgomery –connecting residents with community-based care to prevent hospital readmission;
 - MCPS's priority to address the academic achievement gap;
- Children's Opportunity Fund- Early Care and Education;
- ➤ IPHI's -Trinity Health Community Transformation Grant strategies- Complete Streets, Nutrition Promotion with Family Childcare Providers, School Wellness Councils, Tobacco Reduction, and Enhancing Access to Physical Activity;
- ➤ DHHS's strategic priority for strong collaborative relationship and service coordination and integration and focus on addressing two generation poverty;

TG Concept Development:

Ecosystem Change:

- Create a model that overcomes the traditional systemic health, social services and education silos and support the community through trauma informed, multi-sector and multi-generational, place-based, and holistic approaches that enable families to thrive;
- Develop an Integrated Care Coordination model for: 1) <u>Early Care and Education</u>; 2) <u>Health and Wellness</u>; 3) <u>Behavioral Health</u>; 4) <u>Household Stabilization (Workforce, Emergency Assistance, Resources)</u>;
- ➤ Integrate trauma informed approaches—school, TG program design and implementation, and amongst collaborative partners; and
- Establish a Collective Impact -Results Accountability model to measure results across systems using two national best practice models: Community HUB Pathways Connect & Clear Impact Scorecard.

TG DES 5 Year Pilot

- The *Thriving Germantown* pilot establishes a Community Pathways HUB to complete family household assessments, and through intensive, integrated case management and outreach coordinate services to address the following (3) three Goals for DES families and children:
 - 1) Assure safe, stable, nurturing relationships and environments for all DES children and families;
 - 2) Improve academic achievement for students attending DES; and
 - 3) Improve health outcomes for children and families.
- In December 2017, the TG 5 year pilot was launched with the goal to serve 150 students and their families in the first year, and additional 90 students and families each subsequent year (serving an estimated #2,000 students and their families);
- Data sharing agreements are in progress with MCPS & completed with TG partners (e.g. Primary Care Coalition Holy Cross Health, Mobile Med, & Care for Kids, Columbia Lighthouse for the Blind, Women Who Care Ministries, Manna Food, Germantown Help, Aspire Counseling, MCAEL, and EveryMind) to measure for collective impact through the Clear Impact Scorecard.
